

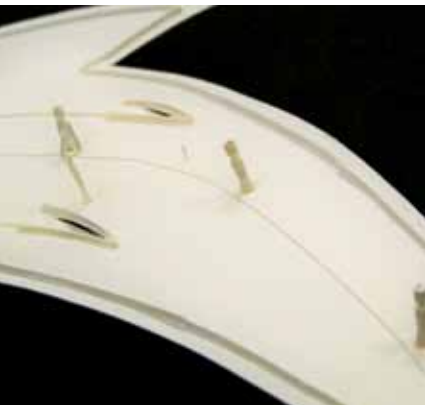

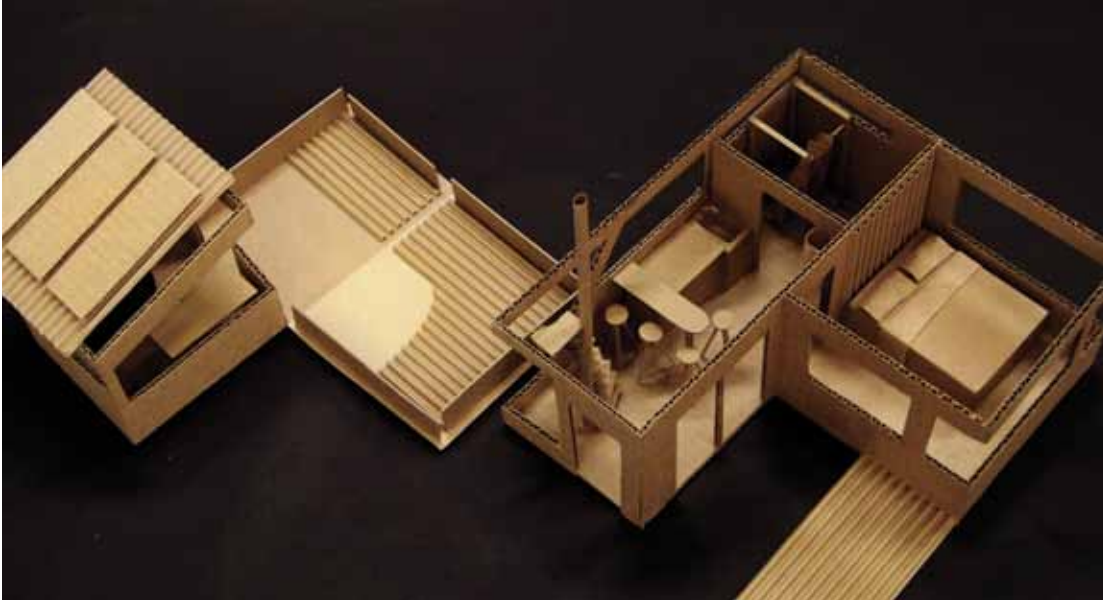


MY DREAM HOUSE

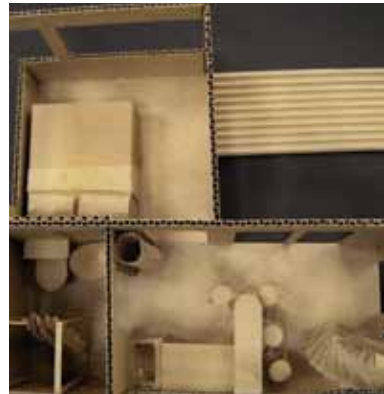

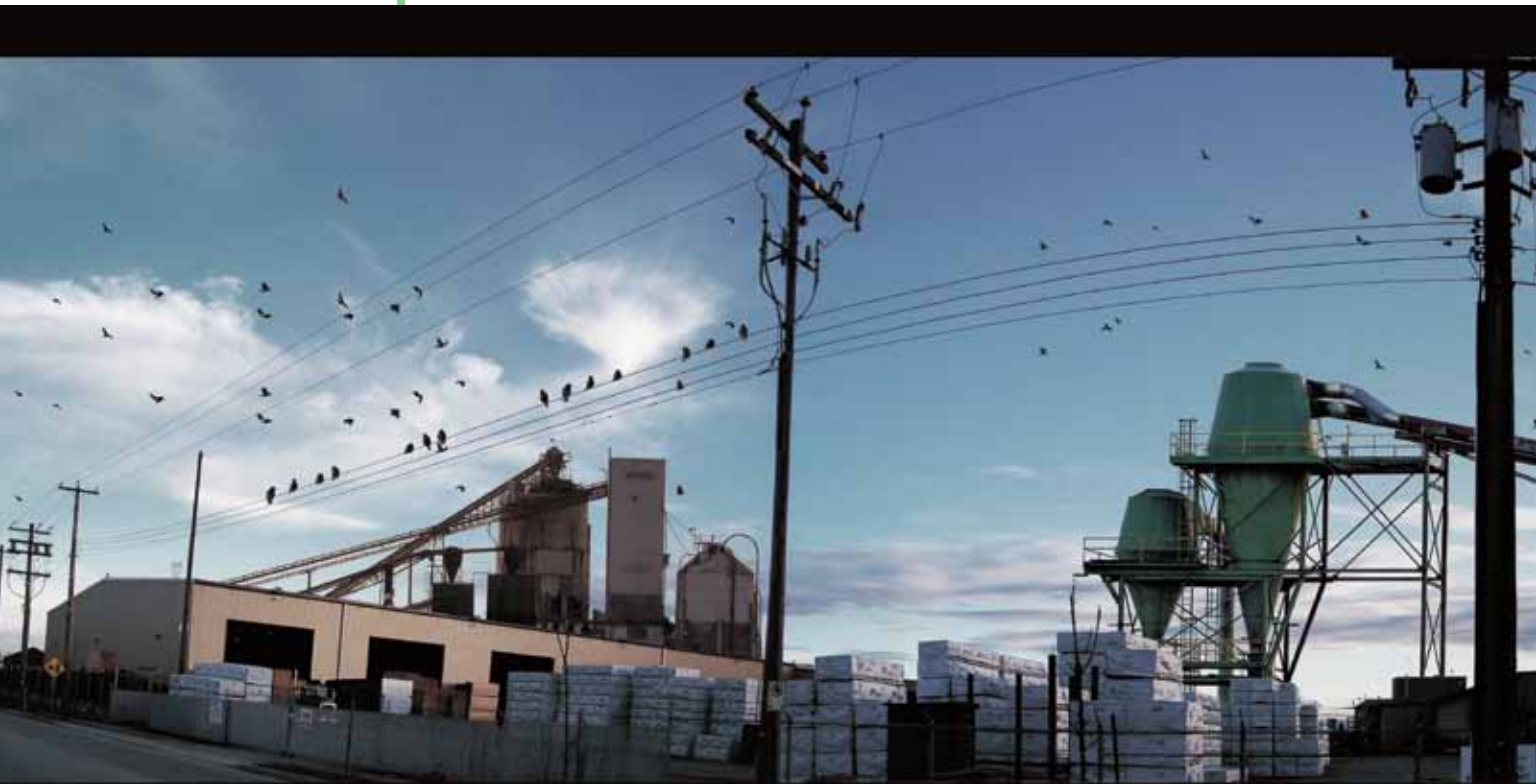

ARE YOU LIVING LOCAL?

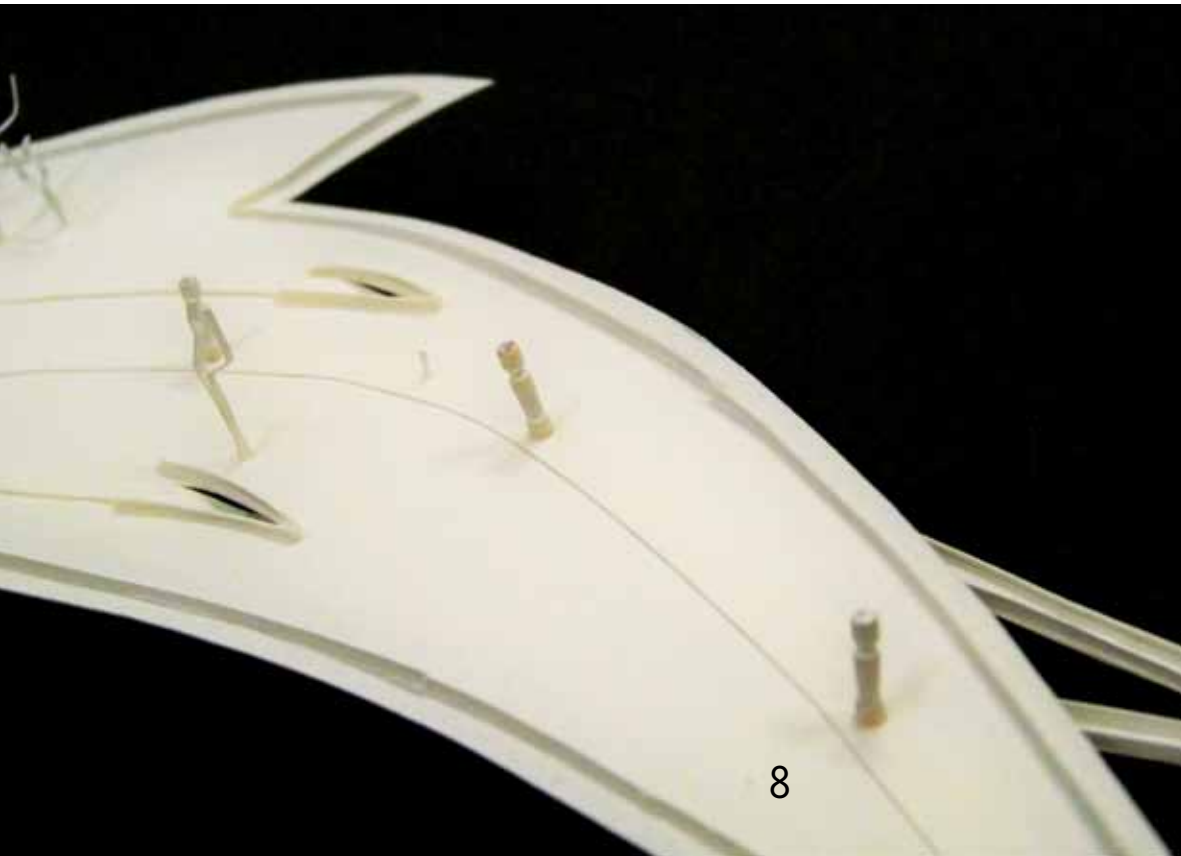
